For An Angel Went Down.. Troubled the Water!

THE HEIFER not only had to be "without spot, wherein is no blemish, and upon which never came yoke"

...but its horns, hooves, and even eyelashes had to be red. Numbers 19:2



The Tanach, or Hebrew Bible, references the Red Heifer in the book of Numbers 19:1-22.

This passage outlines a critical aspect of purification laws in ancient Israelite practice. According to the text, the Red Heifer must be without defect or blemish and must never have borne a yoke. The heifer is to be taken outside the camp and slaughtered in the presence of the priest, who then takes some of its blood and sprinkles it seven times toward the front of the Tent of Meeting. The entire heifer, including its hide, flesh, blood, and offal, is to be burned, along with cedarwood, hyssop, and scarlet yarn. The ashes from this burning are gathered and stored in a clean place outside the camp, to be used in making the "water of purification" for the

Israelite community. This water, mixed with the ashes, is used to purify individuals who have become ritually unclean by touching a dead body. The purification process involves sprinkling the water on the unclean person on the third and seventh days of their impurity. On the seventh day, after being sprinkled, the person must wash their clothes and bathe, becoming clean by evening. The ritual of the Red Heifer underscores the importance of purity laws and the lengths to which the Israelites went to maintain ritual cleanliness before God.





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
